

Introduction to District Elections

Proposed Charter Reforms

- □ The Council is placing a Charter amendment on the March 2024 ballot that would:
 - Increase the size of the City Council from five members to seven
 - Six of the seven seats would be elected "by district"
 - The Mayor would continue to be elected at-large








Election Systems


- 1. "At Large"
- 2. "From District" or "Residence" Districts
 - Very rare; subject to CVRA challenge
- 3. "By District"

Statewide switched since 2002:

At least 275 school districts, 36 Community College Districts, 177 cities, 1 County, and 53 special districts.



Districting Process Overview

Step	Description			
Two Initial Hearings April 11 & May 9	Held prior to release of draft maps. Education and to solicit input on the composition of districts.			
First round of Workshops April 15 – May 27	Held throughout the community prior to release of draft maps. Education and to solicit input on the composition of districts			
Map Submission deadline June 29	Deadline for public map submissions to ensure the map can be presented and discussed at the third public hearing			
Release draft maps July 4	Maps must be posted at least 7 days prior to 3 rd hearing.			
Two hearings on draft maps July 11 & Sept 12	Two meetings to discuss and revise the draft maps and to discuss the election sequence.			
Second round of Workshops July – September (TBA)	Additional workshops held throughout the city to discuss the draft maps.			
Map selection October 10	Map adopted either before or after vote on charter change. Final map must be posted at least 7 days prior to adoption.			
Charter Vote Citywide vote in March 2024	Charter changes put to the voters in the statewide March primary.			
First By-District Election November 2024	First by-district Council elections held. May 9, 2023

Districting Rules and Goals

1. Federal Laws

Equal Population
Federal Voting Rights Act
No Racial
Gerrymandering



2. California Criteria for Cities

- . Geographically contiguous
- Undivided neighborhoods and "communities of interest"

(Socio-economic geographic areas that should be kept together)

- 3. Easily identifiable boundaries
- 4. Compact

(Do not bypass one group of people to get to a more distant group of people)

Prohibited:

"Shall not favor or discriminate against a political party."

3. Other Traditional Districting Principles

Respect voters' choices / continuity in office

Future population growth







Defining Neighborhoods

1st Question: What is your neighborhood?

2nd Question: What are its geographic boundaries?

Examples of physical features defining a neighborhood boundary:

- □ Natural neighborhood dividing lines, such as highway or major roads, rivers, canals and/or hills
- Areas around parks or schools
- Other neighborhood landmarks

In the absence of public testimony, planning records and other similar documents may provide definition.



Beyond Neighborhoods: Defining Communities of Interest

1st Question: What defines your community?

- □ Geographic Area, plus
- □ Shared issue or characteristic
 - □ Shared social or economic interest
 - □ Impacted by city policies
- □ Tell us "your community's story"


2nd Question: Would this community benefit from being "included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation"?


Or would it benefit more from having multiple representatives?

Definitions of Communities of Interest may <u>not</u> include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.





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Public Mapping and Map Review Tools

- Different tools for different purposes
- □ Different tools for different levels of technical skill and interest
 - □ Simple "review draft maps" tool
 - □ Paper-based simple "Draw a draft map" tools
 - □ Powerful, data-rich "Draw a draft map" online tool








Simple Viewing Tool

Very similar to Google Maps:

- □ Zoom in and out, or enter an address to see which district it is in
- □ Choose which overlays you wish to add (if any)
- □ Maps will be posted here when available






Simple Map Drawing Tool

- Total Population Counts only no demographic numbers






Dave's Redistricting App (DRA)

Get involved in the City's process of pursuing the shift from at-large City Councilmember elections to district elections. Join us at the next public hearing to share your thoughts!

The Irvine City Council is holding a district formation public hearing on **Tuesday, May 9, 2023**, during the regularly scheduled City Council meeting at 6 p.m. National Demographics Corporation, the City's professional demographer, will share input received from the community thus far and an overview of next steps.

The City encourages residents to get involved and share their input on where they think district lines should be drawn.

Participate in the meeting or email districting@cityofirvine.org to provide public feedback on where you consider your community or neighborhood boundaries to be.



The City of Irvine is pursuing a shift from at-large City
Councilmember elections to district elections. Currently, City of
Irvine registered voters vote for the Mayor and four City
Councilmembers. Upon completion of the districting process, the
City of Irvine would have six separate voting districts. Beginning in
2024, each voter would vote for the Mayor and one Councilmember
to represent the district they live in.

The City is hosting 14 community forums throughout the process to provide an overview of district formation, the legal requirements and details on how to submit a district map. Residents will have an opportunity to share their input on neighborhoods and preferred district boundaries.

The City is also hosting five public hearings to provide an overview of district formation and the legal requirements, and later in the process, present draft maps.

Language interpretation and requests for disability-related modification or accommodation, including auxiliary aids or devices, may be arranged by emailing districting@cityofirvine.org at least 72 hours prior to each meeting.


